

Peer Review Ethics Policy for the Fourth UNITAR International Research Conference (4UIRC)

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The peer-review process for the *4th UNITAR International Research Conference (4UIRC): Educating for Futures: Empowering Individuals and Institutions for Innovation in the Domain of Human Security, Peace, and Sustainable Development* publications, is founded on the principles of academic integrity, impartiality, confidentiality, and institutional accountability. All manuscripts are subject to a double-blind peer-review process, under which the identities of authors and reviewers are concealed from one another, and all coordination, anonymisation, and documentation are managed independently by the UNITAR Editorial Coordination team. Each submission is reviewed by at least two qualified experts, normally drawn from the Editorial Board, on the basis of scholarly quality, originality, analytical rigour, ethical compliance, and relevance to the [Sustainable Development Goals](#) and United Nations mandates; the [UN Pact for the Future](#) and the Secretary-General's [New Agenda for Peace](#) and the thematic priorities of the 4UIRC.

All individuals involved in the review and editorial process are required to act objectively, to declare any actual, potential, or perceived conflicts of interest, and to recuse themselves immediately where such conflicts arise. Editorial Board members who submit manuscripts do not participate in any aspect of the handling or decision-making of their own work. All materials, reviews, and deliberations are treated as strictly confidential and may not be used for personal, professional, or institutional advantage. Suspected cases of plagiarism, research misconduct, or inappropriate use of artificial intelligence tools are investigated in coordination with the 3UIRC Editorial Coordination Team and may result in rejection, withdrawal, or further institutional action. The entire peer-review process is formally documented and archived to ensure transparency, consistency, and compliance with UN-aligned publishing standards, and all final editorial decisions remain subject to UNITAR's internal clearance procedures and publishing priorities.

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
