SECTION I – MANAGEMENT COMMENTS ON FINDINGS / CONCLUSSIONS

The Phase 4 Project Management Group acknowledges the evaluation's analysis and appreciates the constructive recommendations provided. However, two of the five Recommendations (#3 and 4) are outside the scope of the current Contribution Agreement Description of the Action and Budget. We have taken steps to address feasible improvements, including submitting a no-cost extension request and reinforcing clarity on financial reporting responsibilities. Strategic realignment with the Global Framework on Chemicals and major IT enhancements were deemed beyond the current mandate and resources, but gender considerations are being strengthened through targeted tagging and content updates. Overall, the evaluation has informed actions that will enhance project delivery within existing commitments.

A practical suggestion is for Participating Organizations (PO) to ensure reports align with donor expenditure and reporting requirements prior to submission and for the Administering Organization to vet PO financial reports more closely for compliance with donor requirements before submitting them to World Health Organization Finance. Individual POs can "wish to go" beyond and outside the scope of the Contribution Agreement at their discretion but must prioritize their obligations under the Contribution Agreement.						
Recommendation 4 Improve user experience. Redesign platform functionality to address shallow engagement patterns through simplified navigation, contextualized content presentation, and interactive support mechanisms, possibly exploring the potential of conversational interfaces using Artificial Intelligence (AI) chatbots.	Disagree	This is outside the scope of the current Phase IV Contribution Agreement Annex I Description of the Action (DoA) and Annex III Budget. The shallow engagement patterns are due to the way Google analytics' metrics relying on cookies often rejected by users. The navigation has already been greatly simplified in the last developments, reducing the number of clicks to access the data. No budget was allocated to IT development for Phase 4 and no output was promised in the DoA. Exceptionally, extra budget was shifted to IT development to fix security and back-office issues and to make the more information pages more visible. This activity was not planned in the DoA and was added to the deliverables without removing anything. In addition, the environmental cost of having AI might not be balanced with improved user experience. First because AI chatbots are not reliable and the content delivered would then not be strictly IOMC guidance but could be polluted by industry information/recommendations or worse invented/hallucinated content. If user wants to use AI they can go to chatbots available online. The added value of the IOMC Toolbox is to have approved consensus documentation from IOMC organisations.
