

HLPF oversees a network of follow-up and review processes at the global level (2030 Agenda, para 82)

- Convened annually in July under the auspices of ECOSOC, every 4 years under auspices of the GA (SDG Summit)
- Follow-up and review at the HLPF informed by an annual SDG Progress Report
- Carries out thematic reviews of progress on the Sustainable Development Goals, including cross-cutting issues.
- Reviews of national progress (VNRs)
- Adopts ministerial declaration (July) & political declaration under GA



#### The VNRs: Some Numbers

#### **329** VNRs have been conducted to date

- 22 in 2016, 43 in 2017, 46 in 2018, 47 in 2019, 47 in 2020, 42 in 2022, 44 in 2022 and 39 in 2023
- **188** countries have presented VNRs with **123** countries having conducted more than one VNR. The European Union conducted a voluntary review in 2023.
- 9 countries have not yet presented a VNR
- 65 countries have presented 1 VNR, 107 countries have presented 2 VNRs, 14 countries have 3 VNRs and 2 country have 4 VNRs.
- **42** countries will present their VNRs in 2024.

#### **Management segment**

- Resolution <u>75/290A</u>: Integrate the key messages from the subsidiary bodies of the Council and the UN system on the main theme, develop recommendations for follow-up and feed into HLPF

#### **Elections**


### **Decision-making**

- Decisions/resolutions adopted either without a vote or, at the request of a member, by recorded vote
- Each member has one vote (rule 58); Majority of those present and voting (rule 60)
- Source of proposals:
  - Contained in reports of subsidiary bodies
  - Draft proposals either by a delegation/group of delegations or President's/Vice-President's text
- Practice of consensus in 2023, 31 of 35 resolutions and 56 of 57 decisions adopted without a vote.
- 2023 FfD outcome adopted without a vote
- 2022 HLPF/HLS ministerial declaration voting on para. as a whole without a vote


#### **Participation of non-Member States**

- Rule 72 provides for participation of States non-members of the Council (also Article 69 of the <u>Charter</u>)
- States not members of the Council may submit and co-sponsor draft proposals – put to action at request of a member
- Inclusive approach (rule 72, order of speakers, practice in negotiation of draft ministerial declaration and other draft resolutions)

The Segment will provide guidance and coordination to subsidiary bodies, ensuring a clearer division of labour among them, aligning their work with the implementation of the previous year, bearing in mind the respective mandates and functions of those bodies. (para18)

2. To provide forward-looking policy guidance to ensure coherence and direction in the policies and normative work of subsidiary bodies and specialized agencies relating to the 2030 Agenda as well as to other aspects of the work of the Council.

The Segment will furthermore provide detailed guidance to the subsidiary bodies of the Council and the UN system on their upcoming work on the main theme and develop action-oriented assessment and recommendations so that those bodies best contribute to the preparations for the thematic review of the HLPF. The Segment will review how subsidiary bodies and the UN system work on the interlinkages among the SDGs and the integrated implementation of the 2030 Agenda, guiding their work for the rest of the Council cycle. (para 18)

3. To steer the ECOSOC system towards an efficient and integrated workflow throughout the Council cycle leading up to the HLPF. (para


The Segment will examine key policy issues, lessons learned, best practices and recommendations emanating from the work of the Council's subsidiary bodies during the previous cycle. (para 18)

The Segment will also address issues identified by subsidiary bodies as requiring the attention of the Council at the global level and to build on the policy conclusions of its subsidiary bodies, along with inputs of the UN system, so as to promote the balanced integration of the three dimensions of sustainable development. (para 18)





### The United Nations and NGOs

#### **UN Charter Article 71**

The Economic and Social Council <u>may make suitable arrangements for consultation with NGOs</u> which are concerned with matters within its competence. Such arrangements may be made with international organizations and, where appropriate, with national organizations

after consultation with the Member of the United Nations concerned.



### Requirements of NGOs (ECOSOC RES 1996/31)

international, regional, sub-regional, and national non-governmental, non-profit, public or voluntary organizations.

- >> The work of the NGO must be relevant to the work of ECOSOC;
- >> a transparent and democratic decision-making mechanism and a democratically adopted constitution;
- >> an established headquarters with an executive officer;
- >> in existence for at least 2 years in order to apply;
- >> the authority to speak for its members;
- >> a representative structure;
- >> appropriate mechanisms for accountability; and
- >> financial statements, including contributions and other support, and expenses, direct or indirect.



### The Contribution of NGOs (ECOSOC RES 1996/31)

- >> Provide expert analysis on issues directly from its experience in the field;
- >> Serve as an early warning agent;
- >> Help monitor and implement international agreements;
- >> Help raise public awareness of relevant issues;
- >> Play a major role in advancing United Nations goals and objectives; and
- >> Contribute with essential information at organization events.







#### 1999/4. Long-term programme of support for Haiti

The Economic and Social Council

- 1. Recalls paragraph 17 of its agreed conclusions 1998/1 of 17 July 1998,6 in which the Council noted the need to develop, through a strategic framework, when appropriate, a comprehensive approach to countries in crisis, in which key aspects of durable recovery, peace-building, all human rights, sustained economic growth and sustainable development, in accordance with the relevant resolutions of the General Assembly and recent United Nations conferences, were included. The development of such a comprehensive approach system, donors and intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations. National authorities must take a leading role in all aspects of the recovery plan;
- Affirms the leading role of the Government of Haiti in all aspects of the recovery plans for Haiti;
- 3.
