

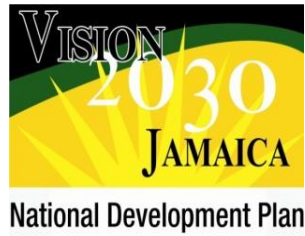

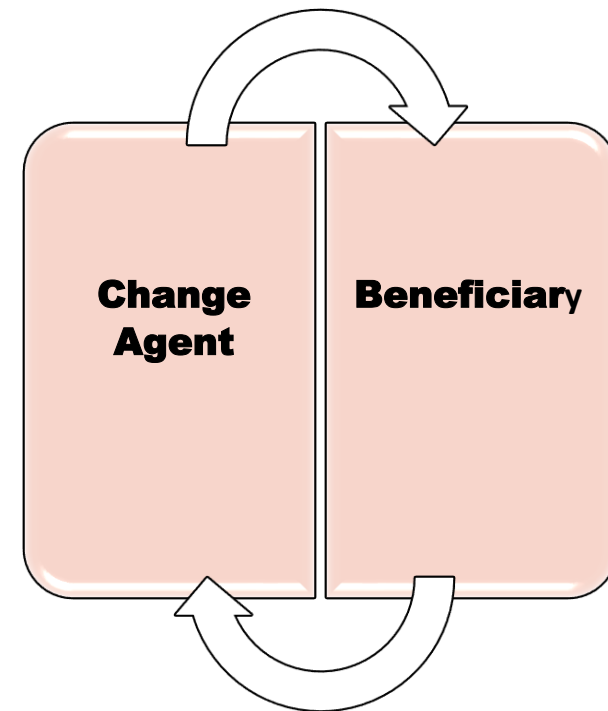

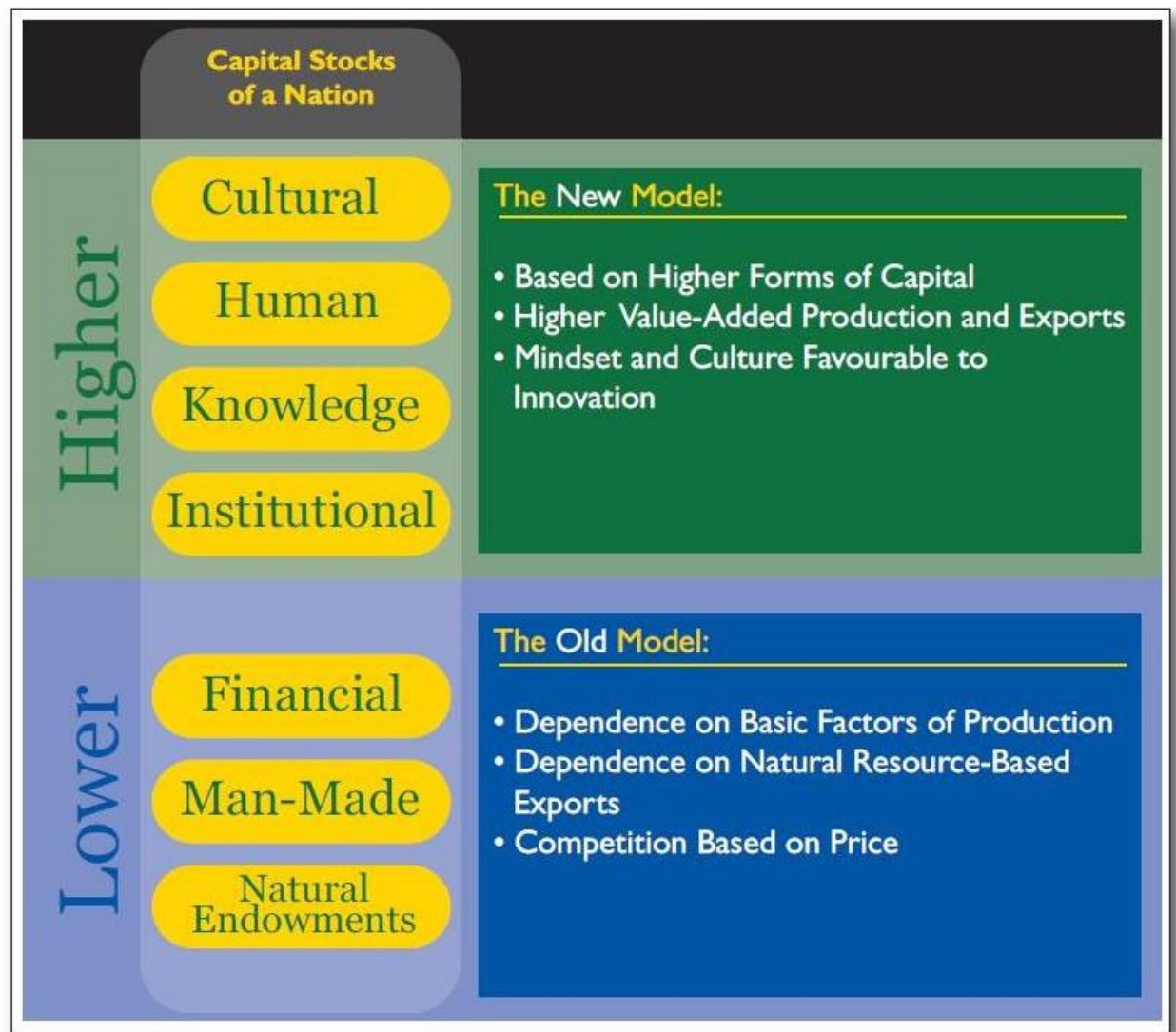

Stakeholder Mapping in Advancing Jamaica's Development

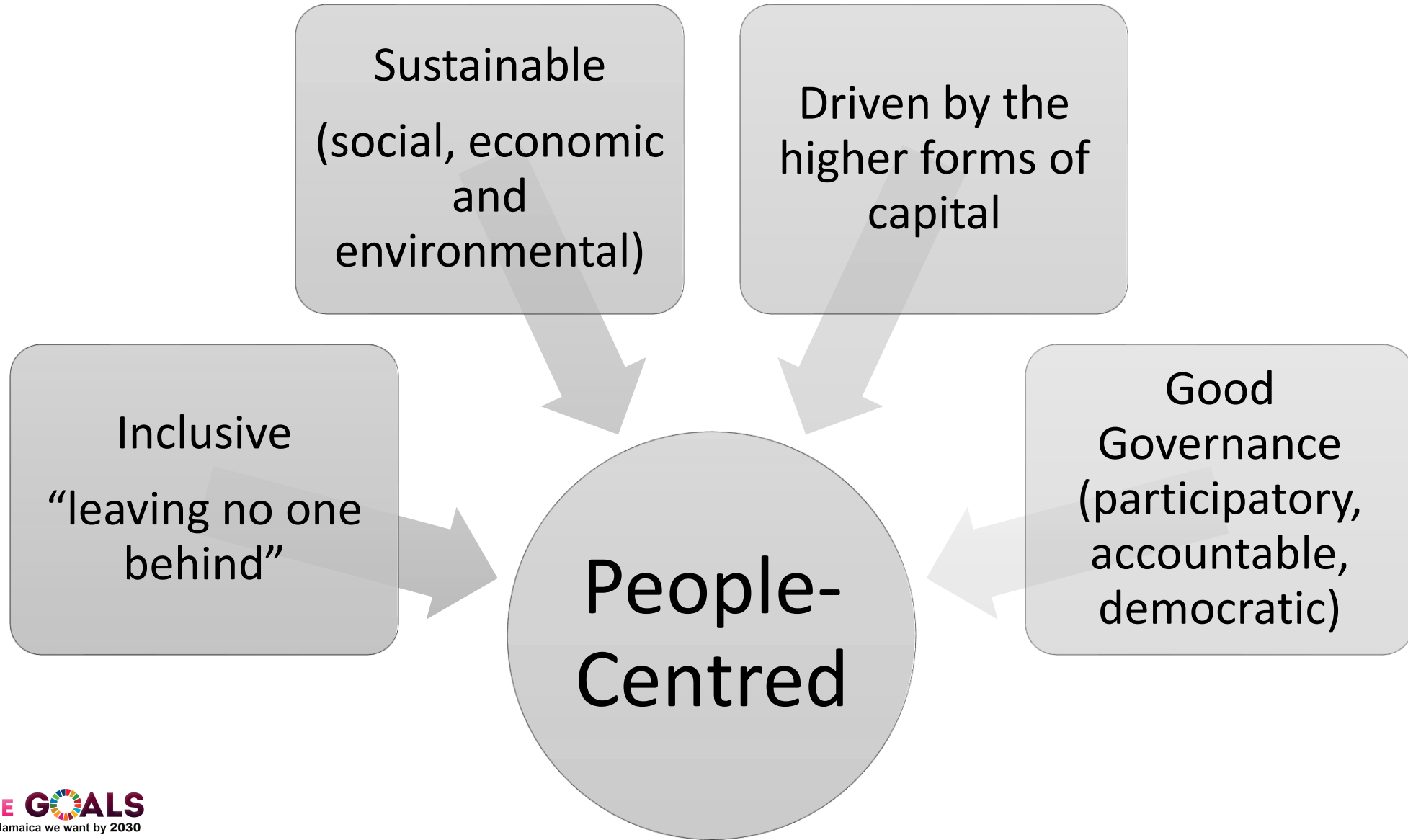
Vision 2030 Jamaica and the SDGs

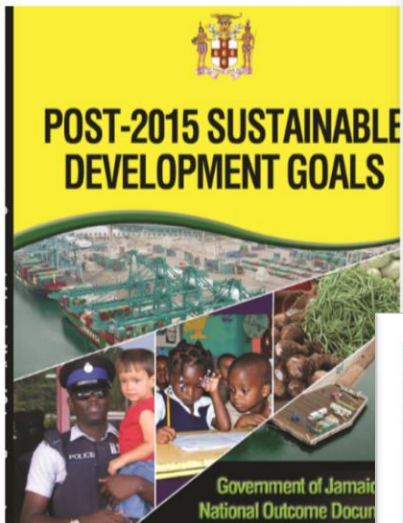

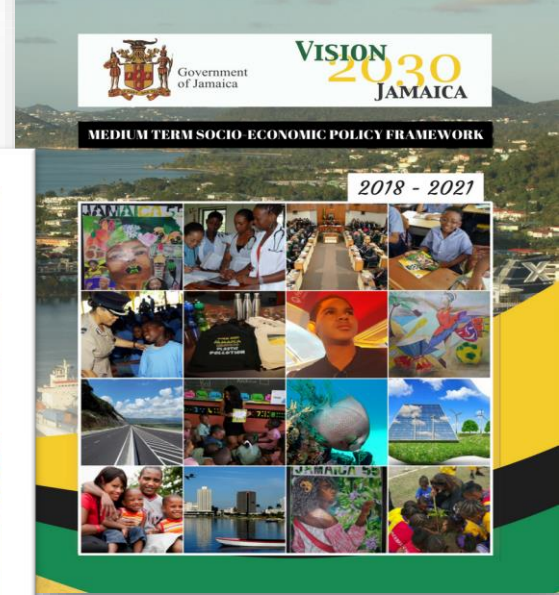
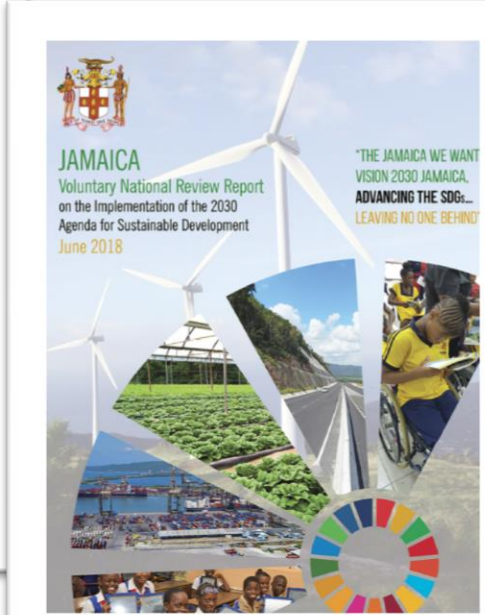
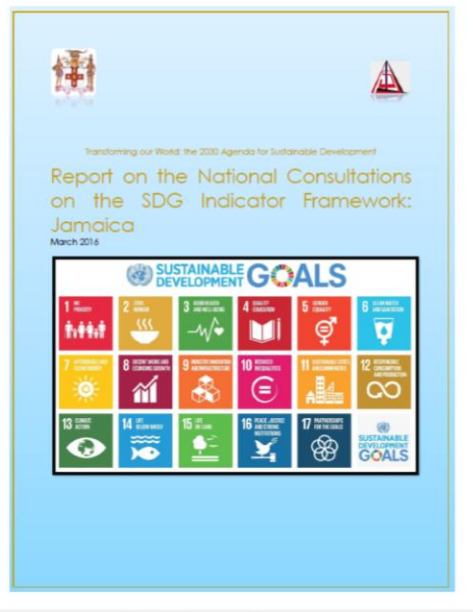
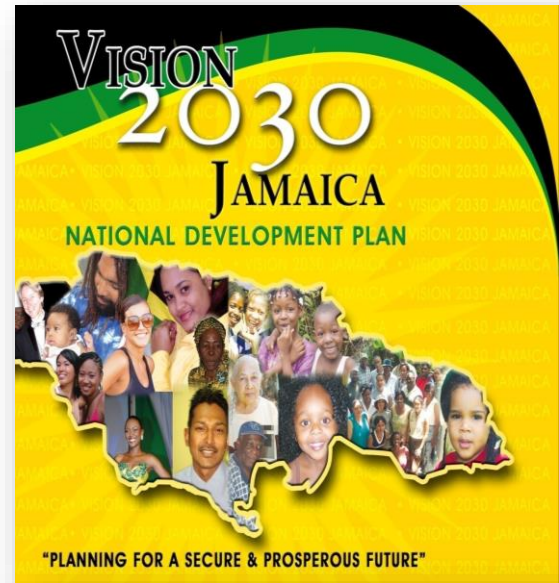
Evidence-Based and Stakeholder-Driven Medium-Term Prioritization



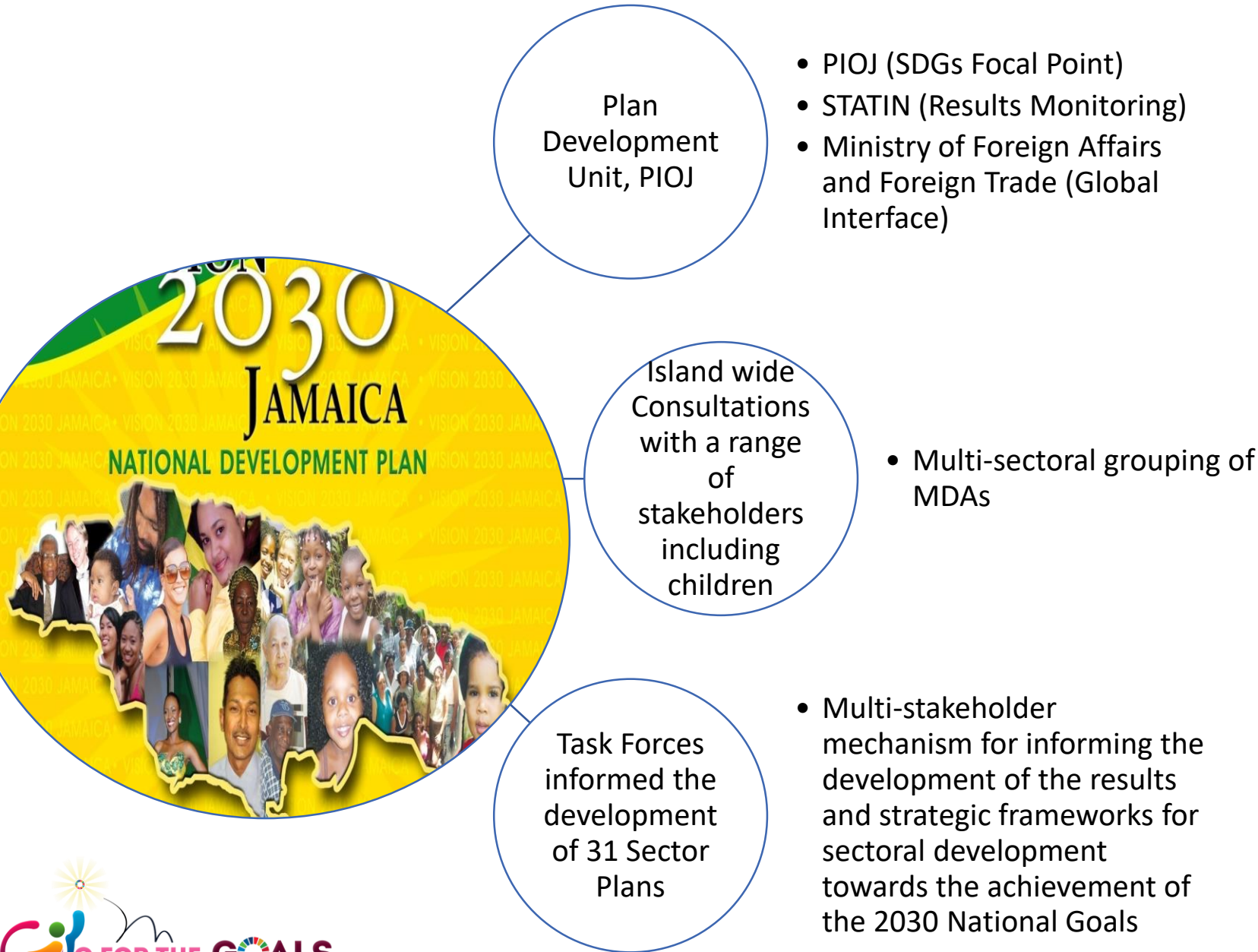
Main Achievements – Integration of Vision 2030 Jamaica and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) through a Participatory Model

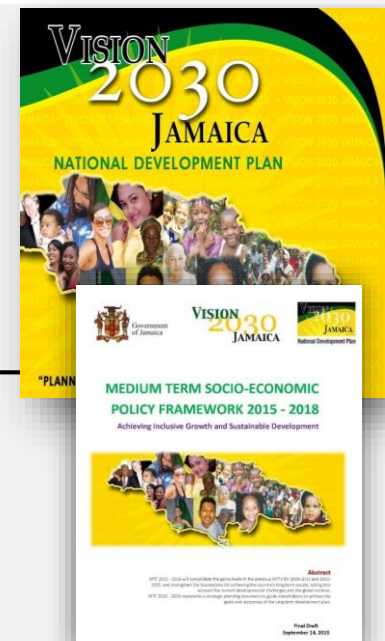


The Road Map was developed through the Mainstreaming, Acceleration and Policy Support (MAPS) process and was informed by a Rapid Impact Assessment (RIA)



The Road Map for SDG Implementation in Jamaica identifies Vision 2030 Jamaica as the mechanism for the implementation of the SDGs in Jamaica. The RIA identified a 91.3 per cent alignment between Jamaica's national development agenda centred on Vision 2030 Jamaica and the SDGs.

Cabinet approved the Road Map in June 2017 and the establishment of the institutional mechanisms for SDGs implementation as well as a commitment to finance the SDGs

Medium Term Socio-Economic Policy Framework (MTF)



Provides the policy and strategic framework for the development of Strategic and Operational Plans of Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) and other partners in development



Serves as the selection criteria for Government priority projects – assessed by the Public Investment Management System (PIMS) and then included in the Public Sector Investment Programme (PSIP)



Serves as the results framework for Medium Term Results-Based Budgeting

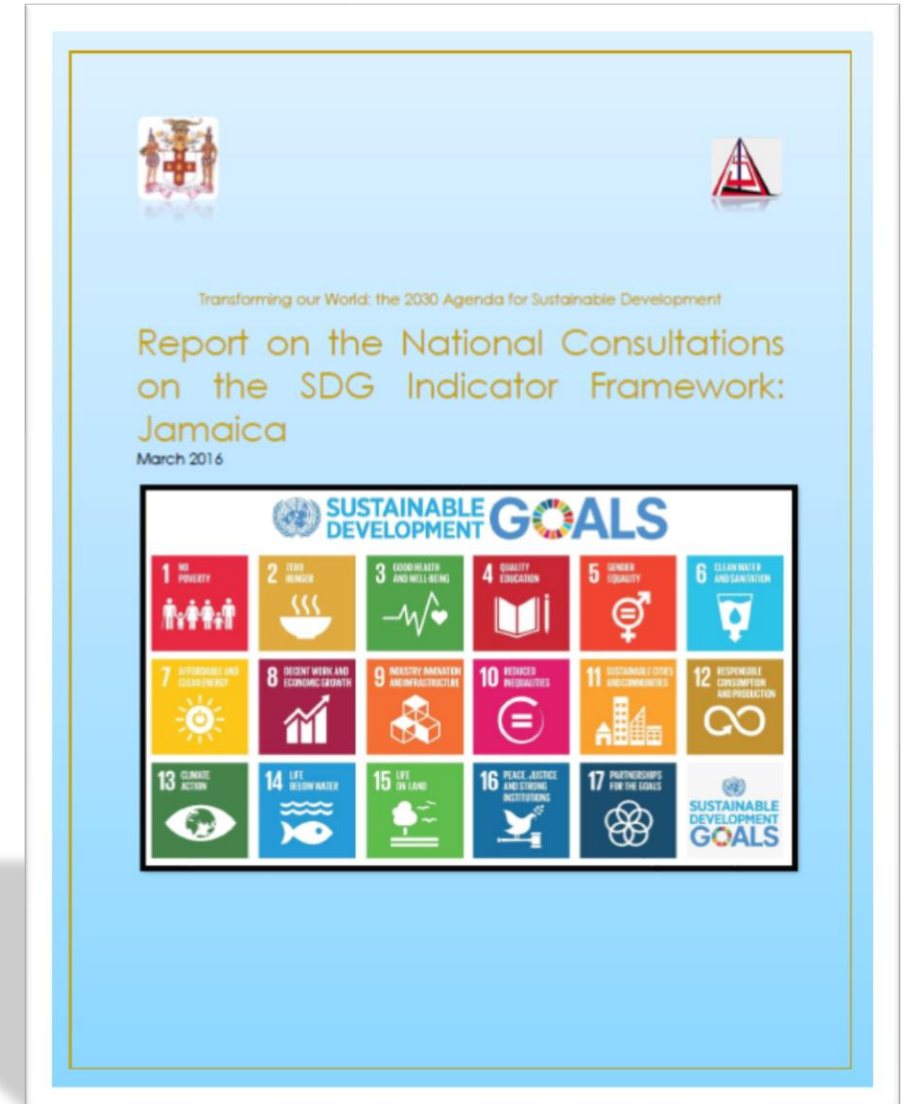

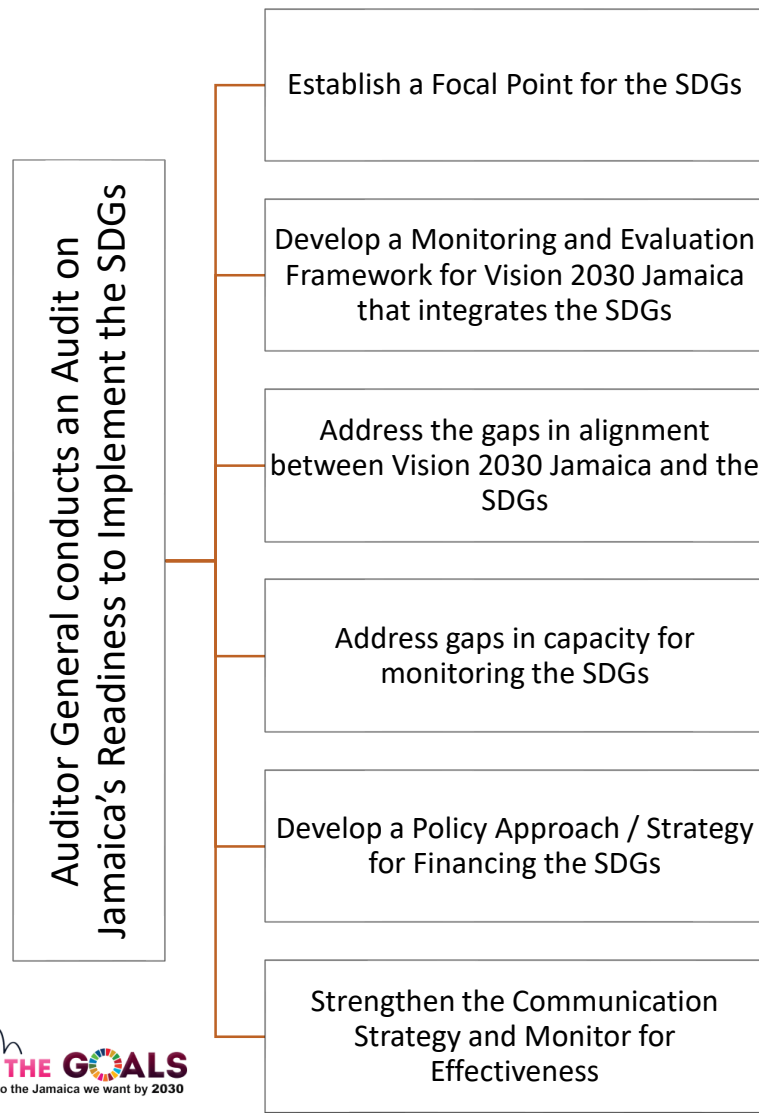

Stakeholder Consultation – Jamaica’s 1st VNR

The process to develop the VNR commenced in July 2017; the stakeholder processes that informed the VNR dates back to 2007 in the plan design phase of Vision 2030 Jamaica

The approach to stakeholder engagement in preparing the VNR had two main components which focused on government and non-government actors:

In over 42 stakeholder consultations specific to the VNR and over 20 stakeholder consultations to inform the development of the 4th MTF for the period 2018-2021

- Stakeholder consultation and sensitization sessions with private sector, academia, civil society and general public – knowledge and idea sharing
- The 2017 staging of PIOJ’s Dialogue for Development Series under the Theme – “The Jamaica We Want: Vision 2030 Jamaica, Advancing the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)...Leaving No One Behind”
- Traditional and social media (incl. promotional video circulated on social media), promotional events, billboards, interviews, community outreach etc.

Stakeholder Consultation – Jamaica’s 1st VNR

- The approach to stakeholder engagement in preparing the VNR had two main components which focused on government and non government actors (continued):
- Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) of the government in facilitating assessment of the strategic framework for development, including institutional processes, sector level strategic priorities for development, policy cohesion, systems for monitoring and evaluation, development results, challenges and gaps – *largely in assessment performance and reporting on development results under MTF 2015-2018 and policy-based strategic prioritization for MTF 2018-2021*

Challenges & Requirements – Participatory Development

It takes time, patience and agility / adaptability

You will face fair and unfair criticism – how you deal with this is critical in determining stakeholder buy-in

Capacity building of all stakeholders is necessary to inform evidence-based decision making and strategic thinking – ignorance in stakeholder engagement is threat to evidence-based decision-making

There is a need to develop systemic processes and transparent governance arrangements – this requires significant investments that promote and facilitate greater levels of accountability

Stakeholder ownership of the process within silos undermine inclusive participation and undermine efforts towards policy coherence
